All collectors are warned about the purchase of these colorful labels. The FIP Undesirable issues Commission is now making a concerted effort to prevent these stamps being listed by catalogue publishers, inasmuch as it has been proven they serve no practical postal need and are produced for collectors, at fantastic profits.

UN NEWS

Two new stamps will be issued January 16, 1968 for the United Nations Secretariat - a 6 cent (yellow, blue, and beige) and a 13 cent (blue, mauve, green and orange) printed in photo-gravure in quantities of 2,900,000 and 2,600,000 respectively by Courvoisier, S. A.. of Switzerland. The stamps were designed by Pashid-ud- Din of Pakistan.

Owing to technical difficulties, the date of issue of the 6-cent definitive stamp, originally scheduled for 16 January 1968, will be postponed until further notice.

A UN Srt stamp will be released March 1, 1968. This will be a 6-cent stamp and will illustrate a statue of Henrick Starcke in the Trusteeship Council.

Also another stamp in the definitive stamp series is the 75-cent to be used to meet the increased cost of postage on registered mail by the UNPA.

A new slogan cancellation "1968" International Year for Human Rights" will be put into use on January 2, 1968. for about 6 months..

SOME NOTES ON DANZIG

Danzig is a natural collateral interest for any German Collector. It is a "country" that can be completed for a relatively modest outlay with the exception of three stamps which are hard to find even if one has the money to buy them. It also has an extremely interesting history. At various times it was an independent city, at times under the control of various princes and dukes, under Poland, under German domination, under a League of Nations mandate which established it as a free city of Danzig; then again under German rule during World War II and today it is part of Communist Poland.

Danzig is first mentioned historically in the 997 when the Bishop of Prague traveled east to a territory called Samland to convert the heathen Prussians. At that time it was called Gyddanyzc and was a small fishing village. The present Polish name for Danzig which is a contraction of the original name Gyddanyzc and which some people claim was made up from two Slavic words meaning "Settlement by the water" Danzig had an extremely natural favorable location at the mouth of the Vistula River along its excellent natural harbor. This caused it to become a thriving commercial port. And later on one of the important and powerful Hanseatic cities. In spite of the fact that it was located adjacent to Polish territory it was not under Polish rule and because its major trading was with the Germans it became more and more dominated by German population which settled there. It was eventually given its freedom by the ruling Prince of the area. After the partition of Poland by Prussia, Russia and Austria it became part of Prussia and eventually part of the German Empire.

Up to this point no stamps had been issued by the city and so that while there are stampless covers from fairly old times available, there was no adhesive postal history. Danzig's first stamps were issued after the League made it the Free City of Danzig in 1919.

It should be mentioned that the Free City was much more than just a city. It consisted of an area of about 1/3 the size of the state of Delaware and also encompassed the cities of Zoppo, Tieegenhof and Neuteich as well as 252 villages and 63 hamlets with a total population in 1919 of 357,000 which grew in the next ten years to about 400,000 of which approximately 95% or more were of Germanic origin. This naturally made the city very German oriented.

The League of Nations had set up the free city so that Poland would have an outlet to the Baltic Sea and at the same time gave Poland certain rights in the city, one of which was the right to maintain a Postal Service and a Post Office. This caused the issuance of stamps by Poland for use in the city and which ought to be included in any complete collection of Danzig. These stamps are Scott # 1K1 -- 1K36

There are also several other Polish stamps which while they were not issued for use in Danzig, caused a political furor in the Danzig Senate which was completely dominated by the German Nazis. These were described in an article in Linn's by Mr. J. L. Brodowski some years ago. There are also several German stamps which also must appear; these are Scott # 492-493- commemorating the incorporation of Danzig into the German Reich in 1939, and another Scott # 241-254, which were merely Danzig stamps overprinted with the words "Deutsche Reich"

Con't at first for a short time, these were only for use in Danzig but later on became legal for postal use in all of Germany. This set also heralded the change in the currency back to the German Mark from the Danzig Gulden currency.

It might be well to mention here the reason why Danzig changed its money from the original use of the German Mark to the Gulden during the German Inflationary period the people of Danzig were suffering so badly that, in the fall of 1921, the League of Nations started to organize a new bank called the Bank of Danzig with a paid in capital of 300,000 English pounds and late in 1923 the new Danzig Gulden replaced the German Mark as the only legal tender in the city. A set of provisional stamps were issued for postage to reflect the new currency, Scott numbers 156-167, on October 31, 1923.

Of course there are many other things that need to be mentioned about this city but it would take much more space than is available in a paper like this.
