Chester County was one of the three original counties of Pennsylvania created by William Penn in 1682. It was named for Cheshire, England. *Chester*, Philadelphia, and Bucks Counties were the three original Pennsylvania counties. At that time Chester County's borders were Philadelphia County to the North, the Susquehanna River to the west, the Delaware River to the east, and Delaware and Maryland to the south.

THE EXHIBIT IS ARRANGED CHRONOLOGICALLY COVERING THE FOUR (4) PRIOR DECADES CONCLUDING IN 1896.

INITIAL U. S. POSTAGE STAMPS WERE ISSUED IN IMPERFORATE SHEETS CONTAINING TWO PANES OF 100 STAMPS EACH ON JULY 1, 1847. THE FIRST TWO ISSUES WERE THE 5 CENT BEN FRANKLIN AND THE 10 CENT GEORGE WASHINGTON. THIS ISSUE WAS DISCONTINUED IN 1851 AND NEW STAMPS INCLUDING THE 1 CENT BLUE IMPERFORATE BEN FRANKLIN ABOVE WERE ISSUED. ONLY THE ONE-CENT, THREE-CENT AND TWELVE-CENT STAMPS WERE ISSUED IN 1851. IMPERFORATE ISSUES REQUIRED THE SENDER TO SEPARATE THE INDIVIDUAL STAMPS BEFORE THEY COULD BE USED. MOST OF THESE EARLY IMPERFORATE ISSUES WERE POORLY TRIMMED FOR USE AND IT IS DIFFICULT TO FIND THEM ON COVER WITH FOUR GOOD BORDERS. DESIGNS OF THE 1851-1860 WERE PRINTED BY TOPPAN, CARPENTER, CASILEAR & COMPANY WITH DESIGNER: EDWARD PURCELL & ENGRAVER: JOSEPH PEASE

## HISTORICAL NOTES

Ben Franklin was the only person to sign all four documents which helped to create the United States: the Declaration of Independence (1776), the Treaty of Alliance, Amity, and Commerce with France (1778), the Treaty of Peace between England, France, and the United States (1782), and the U.S. Constitution (1787). On July 26, 1775 the Continental Congress appointed Franklin the first Postmaster General of the American Colonies. He was 68 at the time. He was honored on the first US postage stamp in July of 1847. This five-cent stamp was good for a single letter carried less than 300 miles.
