Scouting Postal Usages of the 1930s ROPEX 2008

This <u>Special Studies</u> exhibit present chronologically postal usages of Scouting related postal elements produced during the 1930s. This includes:

- Commemorative and Semi Postal Stamps all 14 stamp issues of the 1930s are included
- Postal Stationery all 4 items from reference 1 are included.
- Slogan and Pictorial Cancellations used reference 2 as a checklist, some cancels are not shown, e.g. 1930 Algeria, one on piece known; 1935 USS Lexington, one cover known; 1936 China, catalog image is the only knowledge I have.
- Commemorative Meters lists of older meters are premature at best, Scouting meters were not sought after or saved on entires. I have shown a sampling of what will require significant future research and acquisition.
- Registration labels and handstamps no known list has been compiled, I am showing all that I know to exist
- Perfins (Scout perfin on any stamp) One Scout perfin on UK definitive used on cover. Only Scout perfin known.
- Perfins (Any perfin on Scout stamp) Commercial perfin on 1937 World Jamboree Scout stamp. There are many Dutch commercial perfins on this set of stamps

Exhibit Challenges: Besides the difficulty of acquisition of many of these rare items, the particular challenge of this exhibit is to determine completeness. Although stamp and cancel documentation exists, the extent of meter usage and existence of registration handstamps or labels is just being established. We become inadvertent researchers in the fields we collect

Exhibit History: Previously exhibited at BALPEX '95 in six frames and at OKPEX '98 in seven frames receiving a Vermeil at both. Previously titled "Scouting Postal History of the 1930s" which drew criticism as the exhibit was not a "Postal History" exhibit.

Ten years have been spent acquiring postal history significant enough to warrant this re-showing. Items not seen before include: UK Darlington Scout cancel (Britain's Scarcest Cancellation, ref. 3); 1932 Shanghai Boy Scout Temporary delivery service; fraudulent use of stamp issue announcement cutouts in Hungary; UK British Scout Association perfin on stamp used commercially by Lady Baden-Powell; London Imperial Headquarters meter; and incoming 1933 Jamboree telegram.

Selections have been made for this exhibit to show the wide selection of Scout philatelic elements, demonstrating a large variety of postal usages, classes of service and auxiliary markings:

Also included are a couple of cacheted items which document unusually scarce camps/events or that Scouts were compelled to resort to because their postal services had not as yet prepared anything postal.
