HISTORY OF U S STAMPS - THE ONE CENT VALUES

WITH THE ADVENT OF PRE-PAID POSTAGE STAMPS IN 1947, RATES WERE BASED ON THE NUMBER OF SHEETS AND DISTANCE TRAVELED. THERE WAS ONLY A NEED FOR 5 AND 10 CENT STAMPS, SO OTHER VALUES WERE NOT PRINTED.

THE ACT OF 1851 ESTALISHED A RATE OF 3 CENTS FOR ALL LETTERS SENT LESS THAN 3000 MILES AND A <u>RATE OF ONE CENT FOR "DROP" OR LOCAL LETTERS-</u>
LETTERS SENT AND RECEIVED WITHIN THE SAME POST OFFICE.

THIS MADE NECESSSARY THE PRINTING OF THE <u>ONE CENT FRANKLIN BLUE</u> IMPERFORATE STAMP. THERE ARE MANY DIFFERENT VARIETIES DEPENDING ON THE DESIGN. WE SHOW THE COMMON SCOTT #7 AND #9 AND #9 ON COVER. THESE STAMPS ARE <u>VERY DIFFICULT TO IDENTIFY</u>; PRIMARILY DUE TO THE SMALL MARGINS AND CLOSE CUTTING OF THE **IMPERFORATE STAMP**.



TH SAME STAMP WAS <u>PERFORATED</u> (15 ½) IN 1857, ALSO RESULTING IN MANY VARIETIES, THE MOST COMMON OF WHICH IS <u>SCOTT #24</u>, SHOWN HERE BOTH ON AND OFF COVER.
