The 5¢ Garfield Memorial Stamp of 1882

This is an four frame traditional exhibit detailing the creation and use of the large Banknote Garfield issue of 1882. The exhibit plan is below. The UPU rate resulted in the majority of stamps being used for foreign mail. However, add on uses in the United States are shown, as well as examples of illegal use. The exhibit ends with the 1888 issue in Indigo to comply with UPU requirements. The text is Palatino Linotype; philatelic information is Arial font 9. Exceptional items are outlined in **red** with Italicized bold descriptions. Certified items are designated with the symbol ©. The exhibit is divided into two main chapters, with a Prologue and an Epilogue.

James Abram Garfield (1831-1881), the 20th President of the United States, was shot on July 2, 1881 and died from an infection on September 19, 1881. Garfield's wife, Lucretia, worked with postal authorities and the American Bank Note Company (ABNC) to approve a design and color for a stamp in his honor. The stamp was issued April 10, 1882.
