Colonial Office promotion of emigration, 8 November 1831

A General Agency Office is established for the purpose of communicating information to those who wish to emigrate to the Settlements in New South Wales, Van Dieman's Land, Swan River, and the Canada's, and facilities offered for obtaining Passage and Freightage, which hitherto did not exist. To counteract the misrepresentations made by Brokers, relative to the sailing of their respective Ships, which often entail on the Emigrant a protracted and expensive residence in London, every information will be given, as to their state of forwardness, price of Freightage, Passage, and the precise time the Ship will leave the Docks.

Personal application, or letters addressed, post paid, to Messrs. Gooch & Co. No. 7, St. Michael's Alley, Cornhill, will meet with immediate attention.
