

St. Louis Street Car Mail 1892 – 1915

John B. Harlow's first proposal for moving the mail by electrified trolley was first described in the January, 1892 issue of the Street Railway Journal, with actual street car RPO service beginning on December 5, 1892.

Purpose: This exhibit tells the story of the St. Louis Street Car Mail Service from the beginning in 1892 to the end in 1915.

Exhibit Plan: All approximate routes on a railway map of the period are shown. Included are many Earliest Known Usages (EKU) and Latest Known Usages (LKU), unlisted trip numbers and killers, foreign destinations and unusual rates and usages. Every cancel listed in the St. Louis Monograph is represented. Each different street car marking is illustrated when introduced and the dates of usage of each cancel are listed from earliest to latest for each. The story is chronological as circuits began. Black used to introduce new Chapters and Sub-Chapters. Gray otherwise.

Important items are mounted on a salmon background.
