

# First Days of the 1929 George Rogers Clark Commemorative

Letter from Postmaster General Harry S. New (1858-1937) and marginal inscription block signed on February 21<sup>st</sup> — 4 days before the date of issue.

Issued at Vincennes, Indiana on February 23<sup>rd</sup>, 1929, the 2¢ commemorative honoring George Rogers Clark is one of America's favorite stamps yet few are aware of the event it depicts. Based upon a 1923 painting by Frederick C. Yohn, the stamp shows the 1779 surrender of Fort Sackville by British Lt. Gov. Henry Hamilton to Col. George Rogers Clark. This allowed the then Northwest Territory to join the United States.

This was the first stamp issued that was not available in Washington, D.C. on the first day — it was only available in Vincennes, becoming available at the Philatelic Agency and in Charlottesville, Virginia on the 2<sup>nd</sup> day. It was not available nationwide until the 3<sup>rd</sup> day. A first day record was set when 397,300 stamps were sold in Vincennes totaling \$7,946 in sales.

Presented is a study of the George Rogers Clark Commemorative through the use of first day covers. Production methods as well as domestic and foreign usages are shown. A study of cachets follows throughout the exhibit.
