"Recorded" items will refer to what has been recorded in the "Handbook" produced by the Malaria Philatelists International (MPI).

## Historical Background:

On October 21st, 1960, at the 26th Session of the World Health Organization, it was discussed that the under funded "Malaria Eradication Special Account" needed another way to finance the program. The proposal was made for the issuing of postage stamps world-wide in order to help fund the "global program for the eradication of malaria" and increase world-wide publicity and education about the fight against malaria.

The hope was that the participating governments would contribute stamps or a percentage of the proceeds of the sales of the stamps to the program.

The campaign ultimately failed due to the impossibility of eradicating the insect and disease. Today, $1+$ million people still die a year from malaria.
