NYC EXCHANGE and CITY REGISTERED LABELS: 1883 – 1911

<u>Purpose:</u> This multi-frame exhibit will identify all the known"exchange and city" type registered labels used by the General Post Office, GPO, in New York City from January 1, 1883 to January 24, 1911.

<u>Historical Background:</u> At the 1878 International Congress of Paris and the formation of the Universal Postal Union adopted the use of adhesive labels for international registered mail. There was almost universal approval from world countries except the USA. Under pressure from the UPU, the United States finally began the label usage, beginning January 1, 1883.

The labels changed design as the demand for more were required as the registered mail grew and manufacturing dies wore out. The "Exchange labels" were to be used only on incoming registered mail to the General Post Office and all foreign registered mail processed at the directly at the main Post Office would receive the "City" type label.

The early research began with a number of articles written by Barbara Mueller in the mid-1950's and into the early 1970's. She had developed an identification system for the different label and number types. The system is most difficult to understand and use. This system can be found in the US Scott Specialized catalog but the full use of this system is not total used by auction houses or collectors.

Scope:

The system developed by this exhibitor is easier to understand and use. The different types of labels and usages are put in a proper time line. With all the background data compiled, the proper dating of label usage can be determined and the identification of improper label usage on covers. This is a key issue within the hobby of registered covers being modified from the original mailing condition in the proper time frame.

The estimated total number of registered labels used at the GPO in the 28 years of service comes to 50,683,296 labels. This number being developed from the Post Office department annual registry usage reports compiled between 1876 and 1910. A survivability factor has been determined for an estimate of known remaining cover copies. That number is 0.0002 times the 50, 683,000 usage number to equal an estimate of 10,140 covers. The current census lists almost 7000.
