Warren Stevens President, R. P. A. The Rochester Philatelic Association is now in its 63rd year and is still going strong. It was organized on March 12, 1913. The first meeting was held at the Hotel Rochester with eleven enthusiastic men getting it off to a fine start. In a short time, they began to hold their meetings at the Municipal Museum in Rochester, but during the first World War, interest lagged and the club was only kept together through the efforts of five members who met at various homes.

Eventually, more members were added and they met in the back room of a local stamp dealer. They soon graduated to the Public Library, and after many months the club moved to the Edgerton Park Museum. When the Bausch Museum of Arts and Sciences was built, the RPA followed them to East Avenue, moving in 1976 to the Parish Hall of St. Paul's Church four blocks away.

Down through the years much has been accomplished in the effort to bring stamp collecting and its joys to the general public. A wide variety of programs have been featured at the over 1200 meetings. These activities include outside and local speakers, movies, mini-exhibits, swap nights - in fact nearly everything that was ever heard of in the hobby! Throughout this time there was always an annual banquet, followed by an exhibit, entertainment, and recently an auction.

Early exhibitions of the RPA were local affairs, but during the thirties and forties shows were held in conjunction with the Rochester Museum Hobby Council. In 1950, the RPA assisted in the formation of the Niagara Frontier Federation of Stamp Clubs. As host to this group and subsequent combination with the Central New York Federation of Stamp Clubs, the scope of the exhibitions became international.

The year 1963 was the Golden Jubilee of the Rochester Philatelic Association, and called for a really big show in celebration. This show of over 700 frames, held in Rochester's new Midtown Plaza, was a huge success. This paved the way for subsequent large exhibitions and bourses such as TOPEX'67 and APS'68. Incidentally, it was at APS'68 that the World Series of Philately was inaugurated. The current ROPEX title was initiated in 1971 and used to designate the shows that hosted such organizations as the American Philatelic Congress, the Society of Philatelic Americans, and the American Topical Association. This background of the RPA provides as appropriate credential for hosting ROPEX-76 in celebration of the American Bicentennial.







TAKE A SECOND LOOK

Robert J. Gustafson Life Member, Rochester Philatelic Assn. Director, Scandinavian Collectors Club

The postal issues of the Grand Duchy of Finland would not appear to offer much to attract the average philatelist, due to the unimaginative designs and colors; this is true, however, of many of the nations of Europe during the same period. The first issues of Finland were, putting it mildly, crudely designed, printed, and perforated. The challenge of securing copies of the Arms issues of 1860-75 with undamaged perforations is too great for most collectors, who must settle for one or two missing teeth. The "Russian" types of 1891-1917 do offer a challenge in the typography and lithography printings, as well as the ordinary and chalky papers, not to mention constant plate varieties. But these stamps did not travel the world as they could be used only within the Grand Duchy (or to Russia for a limited period).

So for a real challenge combined with a reasonable investment of funds, why not consider the Arms-type "fyrtaliga" (four-valued) types of 1875-90 (Scott 17-37, Facit 11-26)? Ordinary unspecialized catalogs dismiss this issue with about three dozen listings including the two common perforations (11 and 12-1/2) and a few variations in color.

The first and most scarce stamp is the 32 penni carmine which was printed by typography by H.H. Thiele of Copenhagen in July 1875 because printing facilities in Helsinki were not ready for this needed denomination. This stamp of which 57,500 copies were printed was perforated 14 X 13-1/2 as were the current Danish stamps; there is only one type of this issue.

From here on in, the plot thickens and 123 varieties can be described in terms of perforation(11 or 12-1/2), the printer (Senatens Tryckeri or Karta Sigillatakontorets Tryckeri), plates (Thiele or Finland mint), colors and papers. When the uncommon compound perforations (11 X 12-1/2 and 12-1/2 X 11) are considered, there are 18 more varieties, and the unusual paper varieties augment this by 5 more. All stamps were perforated by Karta Sigillatakontorets Tryckeri. Thus it can be said that a representative collection of these 1875-90 issues would encompass at least 146 varieties, and to this can be added plate flaws, rough perforations and cancellation varieties.


One more constant variety which is unique to these issues is due to their being printed from individual cliches locked in a frame. This feature of the stamps of 1875-90 which puzzles many collectors is the lines or blobs of color along one or more margins. These arise from the use of 'levelers'. The loose cliches in a frame were not perfectly level, so some would press harder than others. A "pull sheet" fixed on a flat

base would print lighter or not at all from depressed cliches. These lighter portions would be cut out and pasted to the base. Another pull sheet was put on top of the cliches and some cliches would then print normally, but more depressed ones still somewhat faintly. These prints were again pasted on the base and this was continued until an even impression was obtained. The surfaces of both the pull sheet and the cliches were thuse both uneven.

The inking roller inked the edges and/or spacers of the raised cliches and imparted a telltale leveler line on the paper, the nature of it being governed by the roughness of the cliche's edges; these lines are of great value in plating.


One may ask- why weren't the frames unlocked and the cliches all levelled so that adjustment of the pull sheet was not necessary? We can only imagine that the manpower requirements and schedules which had to be met prohibited this.

Constant flaws in the electrotype cliches are numerous, and many have been described in Finnish language catalogs and in a private publication by Öhmann. The data on leveler lines was furnished by Wade H. Beery, Mart Manager of the Scandinavian Collectors Club, who in turn had consulted the Ernest H. Wise books published by the Heineman Group in England.









REVOLUTIONARY HISTORY

of counting the chests of tea thrown overboard was given to him.

The man given this assignment performed his duty well. He is remembered and emulated well by his descendant A H who claims that his ancestor was the first Tea Totaller in American History.

Following the Boston Tea Party, tensions grew in the Boston area. Friends and neighbors split in their loyalty to the British Crown. One farmer was raided several times because of his strong Separatist talk. The harassment kept up until he trained his chickens to cackle loudly when strangers came near the coop. This helped him to catch and identify many British sympathizers. This ancestor of J K was thus given credit for being the first to make Chicken Catch a Tory.

Though some prople may claim a relationship, there are no known descendants of this young man whose mother warned him many times, "Nathan, please don't hang around with the British". He

He made sausages and his wife made salads and baked goods for him to sell. The people liked his store and admired his pluck, despite his delicate health. They frequently told their friends to go over to the Delicate Hessian's Store and buy some of his good food.



OUR FIRST POSTAL CARD

Austria issued the world's first Postal Card in 1869. This led to a great deal of concern that the general public would be able to "see everything" from the open back. However, its inexpensive postage rate made it extremely well received.

The United States was slow to get on the bandwagon waiting until December 1872 when Congress appropriated the money for printing these cards. The Morgan Envelope Company finally released the first penny postal on May 12, 1873 at Springfield, Massachusetts.

The first (large watermark) card was printed in a quantity of 31,094,000. The cards were printed from steel plates manufactured by the American Bank Note Company. The

printing was made 36 "up" in sheets of 72. The individual cards measured 5 1/8 X 3 inches (130 X 76mm). Both inverted and inverted reversed watermarks are known to exist.

Difficulty in the manufacture of the large watermark cards led to the discontinuance of printing on May 29, 1873. Starting in July, cards were again produced but with a change in paper stock and the introduction of the small watermark. The earliest reported postmark on these new cards was July 6, 1873. The new card stock was manufactured by the Hudson and Cheney Paper Company of North Manchester, Connecticut. There were 207,851,700 of these cards printed.

The unwatermarked cards are rare. These were from a trial run in July, 1873. The vast majority of "unwatermarked" cards are from very late impressions of the worn wire monograms used to apply the watermarks to the cards.

One major variety on these cards is the so-called "big-hole" defect. There are many plate flaws that can be collected and many enjoyable hours can be spent searching for them.

As these cards were issued before machine cancels came into general use, the same hand cancels used on early stampless covers were also often used on these cards. Large collections of fancy cancels can be assembled. Early RPO, Steamboat, Street-car, and Territorial cancels can be collected. Advertigers found that Postal Cards were a fine source of promotion, creating still another classification for collectors. Happy Hunting:



Cachet: The printed show cachet consists of a 13 star flag and drum of freedom to the left of the cover. The entire lower portion of the cover is a reproduction of an early political cartoon featuring a disjointed snake (the Colonies) facing a Griffin (England) accompanied by the slogan "JOIN OR DIE". A different color cover will be used each day of the show.

Cancel: The Flag style USPS cancel is based on a "version" of the flag of 1777, which had no official arrangement for the stars in the field. The ROPEX-76 flag cancel has 12 stars arranged around the 13th. The dates 1776 and 1976 are placed between the stripes of the flag. Below the flag appear the words "AMER-ICAN REVOLUTION BICENTENNIAL". The left side of the flag is partially "wrapped around" the date hub which identifies the "ROPEX STATION/ROCHESTER, N.Y.".

Card: The ROPEX-76 Souvenir Card commemorates the sesquicentennial of the founding of the first Volunteer Fire Company in Monroe County, New York. It features an enlarged reproduction of Scott # 971, issued by the United States in 1948 to honor Volunteer Firemen. A picture of an early "pumper" taken from an old steel engraving and appropriate text also appear on the card which was printed in two colors (Rose Carmine and Black) in a limited edition of 750 copies.




