- 2 *Sputnik Programs and Hockey*, David Schue\* [Thematic]  
A brief and fun look at two of the three ROPEX 2007 themes illustrated through postage stamps from around the world.
- 3 *The Gentle Art of the Snowman*, Karen M. Barber\* [Thematic]  
A one frame look at the snowman—building of it and uses of it artistically and for advertising.
- 4 *Washington and Franklin Coils—1910 Issue Perf 8.5*, Gregory Shoultz [Postal]  
This exhibit features the 1910 perf 8.5 Washington and Franklin coils. It shows the basic production and usages of the five denominations of the issue.
- 5 *Washington and Franklin Coils—1912 Issue Perf 8.5*, Gregory Shoultz [Postal]  
This exhibit highlights two changes in stamp design for the 1912 issue. It shows examples of coil production and various domestic and foreign usages on cover.
- 6 *The 5¢ Prexie Blues*, Jeffrey Shapiro [Postal]  
A selection of rates on commercially-used covers from the late-thirties through the late-fifties, franked solely with the 5¢ Prexie issue.
- 7 *The Sweet Sixteen—Earliest Pennsylvania Post Offices*, William Schultz [Postal]  
Presents an historical review honoring the 16 earliest Pennsylvania Post Offices underscoring the early development of the postal system.
- 8 *Chester County, PA Multiple Stamp Usages 1856 to 1896*, William Schultz [Postal]  
Highlights the routes, markings, rates, and usages from small Chester County P.O.s in southeastern PA utilizing covers with multiple stamps.
- 9 *Cheapskates*, Robert L. Markovits [Postal]  
A 100+ year sampling of postal misuse of U.S. postal cards and stationery by design or in error by mailers.
- 10 *Hungary—First Madonna Issue: Two-Currency Frankings 1921–1925*, Fred Fawn [Postal]  
This exhibit focuses on a unique method of franking: the short-time usage of the inflationary Madonna stamps in combination with the new Pengo-Filler stamps.

This one frame exhibit displays the various FFCs from each stoppage city, their commemorative cds, and the airmail surcharge fee due to different sectional calculations.
- 12 *Innovative and Versatile: First Issue United States Stamped Envelopes 1853–1860*, Ken Lawrence [Postal]  
How stamped envelopes added new dimensions to written communication during the brief dynamic antebellum era of national expansion driven by the California gold rush.
- 13–16 *Baseball*, Andrew Hodge, [Thematic, Youth—Age 12]  
A look at the sport of baseball, its leagues, its teams, its players, and its stadiums.
- 17–20 *Sailing Ships and the Sailors who Sailed Them*, Chris Hodge [Thematic, Youth—Age 13]  
In this exhibit, I am going to talk about different kinds of sailing ships, the people who used them, and how they were used.
- 21–23 *Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II*, Alyssah Xeniah C. Alcalá [Thematic, Youth—Age 13]  
The illustrious life and reign of Queen Elizabeth II using postage stamps and other related philatelic materials issued by various issuing entities around the world.
- 24–28 *Falconiforms*, Tim Hodge [Thematic, Youth—Age 15]  
This exhibit shows some of the many species of birds of prey, their characteristics, behavior, use as national symbols, falconry and conservation.
- 29–33 *Apollo Soyuz Test Project*, John Macco [Illustrated Mail]  
Crew selection and training, prelaunch tests, launch, rendezvous and docking, recovery, and commemoration by many nations of the first joint space venture ever attempted.
- 34–36 *United States Non-Denominational “A” Eagle Rate Change Stamp*, David T. Robinson\* [Illustrated Mail]  
A first day cover exhibit arranged in alphabetical order of cachet designers showing all formats the stamps were issued in.
- 37–40 *5¢ Circus Wagon*, Raymond M. Stone\* [Illustrated Mail]  
Released August 31, 1990 in Syracuse, NY, this definitive workhorse is shown in a traditional first day cover study of cancels and cachets of the issue.

- 41–45 *10¢ Canal Boat*, Raymond M. Stone\* [Illustrated Mail]  
Buffalo, NY hosted the first day release of this stamp April 11, 1987. This FDC exhibit displays official and unofficial cancels along with various cachets.
- 46–55 *Hand-Drawn and Hand-Painted Cachets by Watercolor Artist Vaughn Hord 1980–1993*, Kurt Laubinger [Illustrated Mail]  
An exhibit showing mostly first day covers for commemoratives, definitives, expedited mail, and duck hunting stamps.
- 56–60 *Are We There Yet? Adirondack Hotels: The Classic Period to World War I*, Arthur H. Groten, M.D. [Display]  
This display class exhibit looks at the golden era of the Adirondack hotel, large and small, c. 1860–1915.
- 61 *HockeyMania*, Andrew All [Thematic, Youth—Age 9]  
Exhibiting hockey stamps, covers, first day covers, and souvenir sheets from around the world.
- 62–63 *Jamestown, Virginia—Cradle of the Nation*, Alice Johnson\* [Display]  
This display exhibit tells the story of Jamestown, VA, from its 1607 settlement to the present day as it readies for its 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary.
- 64–67 *Everybody Must Get Stoned (but not Bob Dylan’s version)*, Eleanor Steeb\* [Display]  
This display exhibit details man’s relationship with stones, from early caveman time to modern day, explaining their discovery, mining, processing, and usages.
- 68–73 *Letters to the Stars*, Regis Hoffman [Display]  
Hollywood fan mail from the silent era to the present day.
- 74–80 *It Would be Sacrificing the Nation’s Honor*, Napoleon [Display]  
Postal and non-postal material showing the effects of WW I on unoccupied Belgium and its people.
- 81–83 *Life is Just a Bowl of Cherries—Idioms Illustrated and Explained*, Thomas M. Fortunato\* [Thematic]  
An interactive fun look at a number of English language expressions shown through a variety of postal elements.
- 84–86 *Foxes*, Theresa Meegan [Thematic]  
The beautiful fox in nature and fables.

The Canal from its discovery, to first dreams of uniting the oceans, to the events which led to its construction and transfer back to Panama.

Covers and telegraphs from northeast companies in the pre-Western Union acquisition era, including items from the Civil War with revenue tax applied.
- 98–100 *The U.S. Bank Notes: Identification and Major Variations*, Robert Meegan [Postal]
- 101–110 *The U.S. Large Bank Note Era of 1870 to 1890: A Study of Domestic, Territorial, and International Rates*, Robert Meegan [Postal]
- 111–119 *Canada—1897 Diamond Jubilees*, Herbert McNaught [Postal]  
Traditional study of the issue with die and plate proofs, proofs, plates and imprints, re-entries, specimens, forgeries, perfins, and cancellations with Canadian and international usages.
- 120–127 *A Rate Study of the “Admiral” Stamps of Canada 1912–1928*, Clinton Many [Postal]  
The postal rates of Canada throughout the tumultuous periods before, during, and after WW I as new services were introduced or changed by the Canadian Postal Service.
- 128–135 *The United States Special Delivery Issues of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century 1885–1902: The Running Messenger*, Robert L. Markovits [Postal]  
A traditional exhibit showing essays, trial color proofs, proofs, stamps and postal history, including the U.S. possessions of the issues.
- 136–138 *Hudson, New York Post Marks and Postal Markings 1794 to 1900*, George F. DeKornfeld [Postal]  
Two part postal history exhibit—Part 1: Stampless Era; Part 2: Stamp Era (up to 1900). Shows officially applied markings (cnds, handstamps killers, etc.).
- 139–143 *The Circular Datestamps and Provisional Markings of the Queensland TPOs*, David Hopper [Postal]  
Provisional and TPO cds markings of Queensland, Australia up to 1932. Used mostly as transit markings, a significant proportion is shown as primary cancelers.

An exhibit displaying stamps, postal history, archival material of issued adhesives, latest research on postal rates, and census of key postal history items.

Early stamps of the Russian Rural Post system, single and two design stamps, the hand printed issues, and some special studies of the Zemstvo Post.

Display exhibit of USSR and USA satellite launch and recovery covers and stamps including autographs of cosmonauts and astronauts.

This exhibit shows mail of the British Army/Imperial Forces that conquered Ottoman Palestine/adjacent territories, then mail of the military administration period that followed.

“Timbromanie” is a special study from the perspective of stamp exhibiting and judging.
- 171 *ACE Art Cover Exchange*, Diane Bombard\* [Illustrated Mail]  
Examples of handmade postally used modern covers created by members of the organization. Artwork in a variety of styles are shown.
- 172–178 *Stamping Out Tuberculosis*, Florence Wright\* [Non-Competitive Invited]  
This exhibit tracks tuberculosis through history, its victims, causes and cures, using stamps and other philatelic material as well as seals issued for anti-tuberculosis benefit.
- 179–183 *Woldenberg POW Camp*, Raymond M. Stone\* [Non-Competitive Invited]  
A sampling of the philatelic issues of the World War II POW camp at Woldenberg, housing over 6,000 Polish officers 50 miles northwest of Poznan.
- S1–S7 *Space...the Final Frontier—on U.S. First Day Covers*, Conrad Novick [Non-Competitive Invited]  
A display of United States ‘space’ stamp issues on first day covers ranging from 1948 to 2006 presented in an unconventional display method.

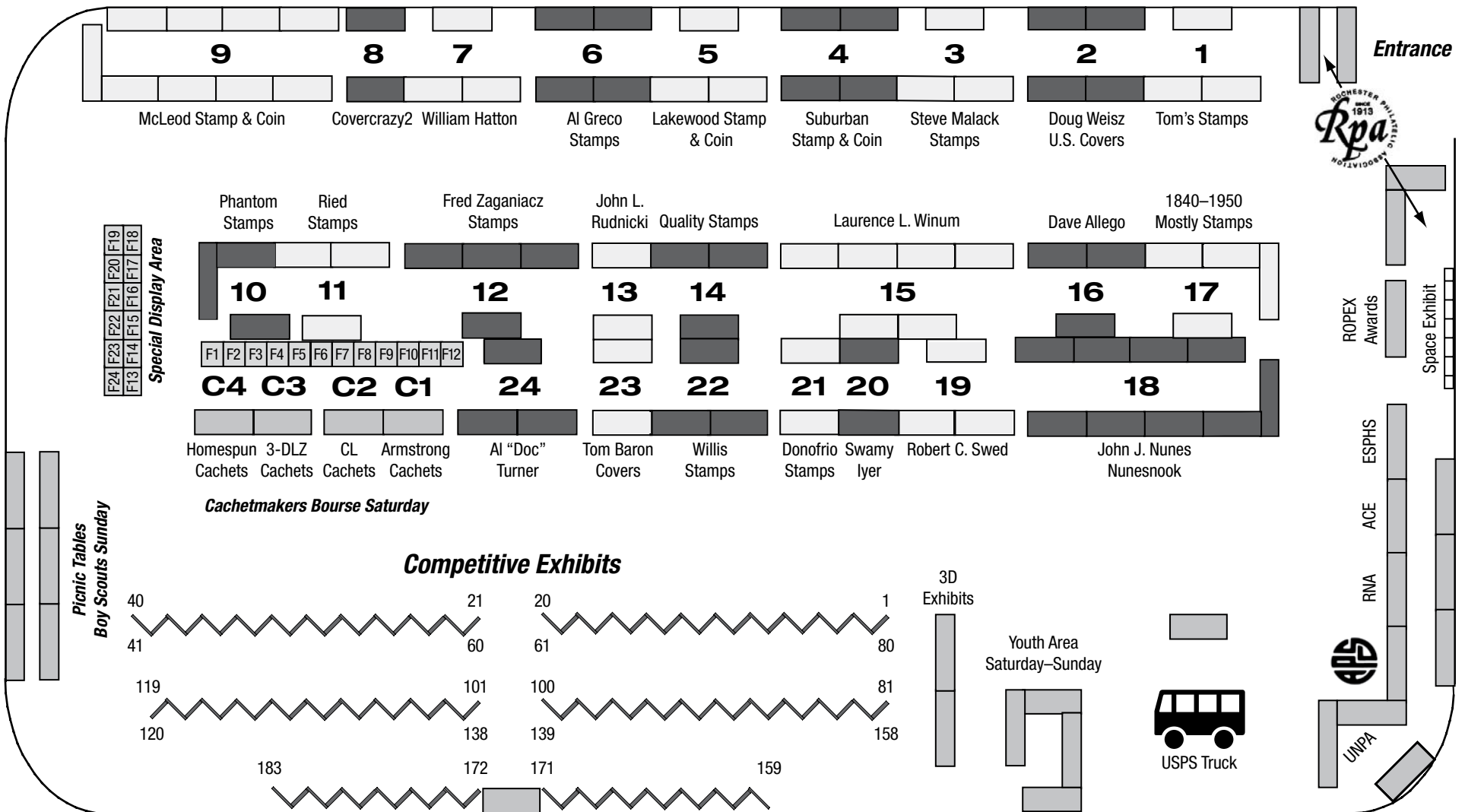

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## 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Sputnik I

### *A Worldwide Sensation*

Tyuratam, Kazakhstan, October 4, 1957, the long-delayed countdown reached the moment of engine ignition. The ground shook as the launch pad was blasted by the plumes of the booster's clustered engines as the rocket climbed. Still, little is known about Sergei Korolev, the Chief Designer of Spaceships. His importance to the Soviet space program matches that of von Braun to the Americans. Korolev watched through a periscope and then turned to a radar console to verify the flight path. Then he moved to another section where radio receivers were tuned to the satellite's frequency.

A beep-beep signal from space announced that the USSR's—and the world's—first man-made satellite was circling the earth. The Soviets called their satellite Sputnik, or fellow traveler. It weighed 184 pounds and measured 23 inches in diameter, the size of a basketball, and traveled around the earth every 96 minutes. The satellite was packed with instruments to gather and transmit information on atmospheric density, temperature, cosmic rays, and micrometeoroids. Sputnik's launch created a worldwide sensation.

The *New York Times* set the tone for America's reaction to the milestone with an unusually large Saturday edition on October 5, 1957. Most of the front page was devoted to Sputnik stories beneath a banner headline and a world map showing the satellite's track.

U.S. Scientists had known for some time that they were in a space race with the Soviets. Disappointed, but not surprised, they had lost the space race.

President Eisenhower regarded Sputnik I a particularly insignificant achievement. But the president had misjudged the impact of Sputnik on American journalists, the average citizen, and the U.S. Congress. From every corner voices were raised about the sudden Soviet "threat in

space." Critics interpreted the success of Sputnik as an indication that American science was falling apart, that the military was not prepared to defend the nation, and that our educational system had failed the nation. The government's response to these fears and complaints was to dramatically reshape the nature of these institutions over the next decade, including the creation of NASA in 1958.

To commemorate Sputnik I, the Soviet Union issued two stamps: *Scott #1992* on November 5, 1957 and *Scott #1993* on December 28, 1957. The design shows Sputnik I circling the globe. In the years since the launch of Sputnik the Soviets commemorated its many space achievements on stamps, including the September 17, 1982, 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary souvenir sheet, *Scott #5083*

## Ice Hockey

### *ROPEX on Ice ... Sorta*

The Rochester-Buffalo region is a hotbed for hockey of all levels, and players at all levels have skated on the rink that ROPEX calls home this year. The Rochester Americans hold training camp at the ESL Sports Centre, Monroe Community College plays their home games here, and Section V high school hockey holds their championship games here. Three Rochester hockey players who honed their skills at the ESL Centre represented the U.S. at the 2006 Winter Olympics. Images of inductees to the Rochester Americans Hall of Fame look down at us from the walls

At ROPEX you will find stamps and covers commemorating the Olympic and World Championship games that Rochester athletes participated in. You will also find other hockey-related philatelic materials from around the world.

Hockey is increasing in popularity worldwide. The International Ice Hockey Federation currently has an all-time high membership of 65 countries. Most of these countries have issued hockey-related stamps.

The first ever stamp featuring a hockey player was issued by Switzerland for the 1948 Olympics held in St. Moritz. The player featured is wearing a cap, since games were played outdoors then. A 1959 stamp from St. Pierre & Miquelon shows hockey being played on an outdoor pond, with spectators standing in the background. The Olympic set issued by the U.S. for the 1980 Olympic games *miracle on ice* at Lake Placid is a favorite of hockey enthusiasts and philatelists alike. A 1995 Swedish stamp depicts Peter Forsberg's gold medal-winning goal against Canada. Canada issued stamps in recent years honoring several members of the Hockey Hall of Fame, located in Toronto.

The Soviet Union started issuing hockey stamps in 1949. A 1959 USSR set of three stamps commemorated the World Hockey Championships held in Moscow. These stamps seemed to announce the arrival of the Soviets as a hockey power, as they had won a gold medal at the 1956 Olympics, but the home team finished in second place at the Moscow championships. In subsequent years, the Soviets would issue additional stamps highlighting their olympic and world championship victories.

Hockey continues to grow in popularity worldwide, even in countries where it is not a traditional sport. In January of this year, the United Arab Emirates played in their first international ice hockey tournament: the 6<sup>th</sup> Asian Winter Games in China. The UAE team triumphed over Thailand 4-0 in their very first international contest. However, the UAE team suffered some growing pains; their next game in the tournament was a 38 - 0—yes, thirty-eight to nothing—loss to top-rated Kazakhstan. Practice, practice, practice...

## 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Boy Scouting

*A Time-Honored Tradition*

The Boy Scout movement was founded in Great Britain in 1908 by Cavalry Lieutenant General Robert (later Lord) Baden-Powell, who was better known as the defender of Mafeking in the South African War. In 1908 he wrote a book called *Scouting for Boys*. Baden-Powell's book described games and contests that he used to train cavalry troops in scouting techniques. Prior to the book's publication, Baden-Powell held an experimental camp on Brownsea Island off the coast of southern England where he put into practice his ideas on the training of boys. His book became popular reading among the boys of Great Britain.

Baden-Powell thought boys should organize themselves into small groups of 6-7 under a boy leader—the patrol and patrol leader. Training would consist of tracking, reconnaissance, mapping, signaling, knotting, first aid, and all the other skills required in camping and similar outdoor activities. To become a Scout, a boy would promise to be loyal to his country, help other people, and obey the Scout law, a simple code of “chivalrous behaviour,” easily understood by boys. This formula for scouting continues today in every country where scouting exists. Symbols of scouting include the hand salute, using the left hand, the fleur-de-lis badge, and the motto *Be Prepared*.

William Boyce and Daniel Carter Beard introduced scouting to the U.S. in 1910. Today, several million young people between the ages of 8 and 18 are members of the Boy Scouts of America (BSA). Prior to becoming a Boy Scout, many youngsters are members of the Cub Scouts. After becoming a Boy Scout, a boy can achieve the following ranks: Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, Life, and Eagle. The last three can be attained by earning merit badges, demonstrating leadership, and accomplishing community service projects. Stamp collecting is one way for a scout to earn a merit badge.

Philatelic Boy Scout material offers a wide range of specialties for the collector including, but not limited to, first day covers, postal history, postmarks, cancels, and thematic collections.

**Stephen L. Suffet**

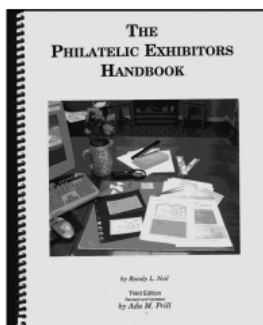

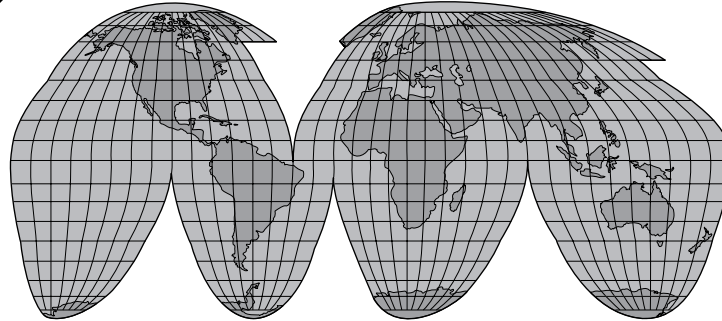
